We were able to complete the project due to the generosity and tremendous efforts of our members and friends, public and private grants, and a final push by the Sugimoto family.

George Sugimoto explained at our mortgage burning ceremony that his family wanted to help pay off the loan so that we could focus on programs for our members rather than on fundraising.

left as their legacy to us. With the New Year, the East San Gabriel Valley Japanese Community Center has a new look! A new logo to be precise. This logo was developed by a committee led by Tim Itatani and designed by Dawn Kiko Cheng. The logo committee worked hard for months, until they came up with a version that was modern enough to speak to the Yonsei and Gosei generations, the future of the center, while still appealing to and honoring the Issei and Nisei generations, who are the foundation of the center.

#### 1 The bridge.

The inspiration for the logo was to convey a bridge—the East San Gabriel Valley Japanese Community Center as a bridge between our families and the Japanese culture, a bridge between generations, between our Japanese and American heritages, between the City of West Covina and the City of Ohtawara, and one that connects our members to the greater community. It is a symbol of steadfast strength filling a void.

#### 2 The horizon.

The horizontal lines at the top create more movement between the panels, further connecting it, and it visually gives the audience another level and dimension to focus on. The community center honors its' past by looking into the future and how it can grow and thrive by growing its' resources, services, programs and activities.

#### 3 The water.

The community center and its' membership is a living entity that is in constant motion. The pattern itself is a timeless, traditional pattern that honors the arts, culture and history of the community center and its' Japanese roots.

#### 4 The banners.

The bridge also looks like a Torii, a traditional Japanese gate or entrance, inviting all those interested in the Japanese culture and heritage to learn about it.

The logo is split into three panels not just because it was necessary to have two posts to give the bridge a strong foundation but because three is significant in Japanese design. The panels evoke the feeling we have at the center: that our family, friends and culture are all connected.

#### 5 Emergent ESGVJCC.

Emergent is defined as "coming into being"; "coming into view, existence"; "arising or occuring unexpectedly"; "demanding prompt action". Combined with the other symbols of life, of future, of connection and growth, the emergent ESGVJCC further gives the narrative of the community center as a moving force; a force that, as with the new design, is coming into being and taking action as it continues to foster the vision of its' founding fathers.

Note also that the ESGJVCC acronym was given more weight in size and color. It is our hope that the ESGVJCC acronym will become so synonymous with the Center that we will be able to use the acronym instead of the full title of the center.

As we embark on the next 60 years, it is our hope that the logo will be a symbol that will come to represent the growing, positive changes in the ESGVJCC and that it will be able to evolve as the center evolves.

The ESGVJCC partnered with State Senator Dr. Ed Hernandez to host a free family health fair in November, Over 300 members of the neighboring community attended this event participating in free health screenings, active living demonstrations, cooking demonstrations, and a resource fair filled with over 20 vendors. With this event focusing on preventative health care and wellness, it featured resources and information on nutrition. exercise, mental health, and other useful tools to live with vitality. Our own martial arts programs, taiko, and voga classes were featured to illustrate the importance of exercising in a fun wav.

#### **FESTIVALS**

The ESGVJCC hosted two free community festivals this year—the Cherry Blossom Festival in March and the Akimatsuri (Fall Festival) in October.

For over 40 years, the ESGVJCC has sponsored annual festivals to showcase the Japanese American culture and share it with the community. These free events were enjoyed by guests of all ages and featured cultural demonstrations, taiko performances, Japanese classical dancing, games, exhibits, craft vendors, and dozens of tasty foods to enjoy.

This year was the 10th year presenting the annual Cherry Blossom Festival. Hosted in conjunction with the City of West Covina, this event welcomed nearly 1.000 attendees who spent the day learning more about the Japanese culture through performances, food, and activities. Some of the great foods included bettarravaki (seared rice on a stick), teriyaki chicken. avoza (Japanese potstickers), and delicious baked goods.

The 42nd annual Akimatsuri celebrated the beginning of fall with event highlights including taiko, minyo dancing, martial arts, and concluded with Japanese ondo dancing. It also featured several exhibits including kimekomi doll making, bonsai, and work from many of the ESGVJCC's programs.
