

ESGVJCC YOUTH PROGRAMS

2025 SUMMER FUN CLUB & CAMP CHIBIKKO

The ESGVJCC is excited to introduce a new summer program, the Kokoro Summer Fun Club! This is a new daycare program for elementary students, grades K-5 that will run from June to early August. Each day will have different arts/crafts activities, fun games, and weekly local field trips! Kokoro Summer Fun Club will operate from 9am-5pm with students providing their own lunch and snacks. We will have special snacks and cooking activities at least once a week as well!

In addition to the Kokoro Summer Fun Club, the ESGVJCC will also be bringing back 2 weeks of Camp Chibikko and 1 week of Basketball Camp! Camp Chibikko is the ESGVJCC's youth Japanese cultural camp with each week focusing on a different theme. This year, the theme for Week 1 will be Wa (Harmony) with a special field trip to Huntington Garden and the theme for Week 2 will be Kyocho (Cooperation) with a special emphasis on the history of Japanese American sports and a field trip to the Terasaki Budokan in Little Tokyo. Throughout the two weeks, campers will also have the opportunity to experience Japanese and Japanese American culture through activities like Suikawari

"Watermelon Smash", Origami, Cooking Activities, Aikido, Karate, and Nihon Buyo while also making lifelong friends and memories! Camp Chibikko Week 1 will take place from July 7-11 and Week 2 will be July 14-18 from 9am-5pm for campers K-8th grade. Lunch and 2 snacks will be provided during Camp Chibikko.

The ESGVJCC Basketball Camp will take place July 22-July 26 from 9am-3pm for Kindergarten-6th graders. During this camp, younger players will have the opportunity to learn the fundamentals to playing basketball while older players will have the opportunity to build upon those fundamental skills and improve their game. For the older players, we are partnering with high school coaches to come in and work with them directly on how to apply their skills in game settings. Registration includes lunch and a morning snack.






